Dear Families

3. **As I write this, coming up this week, more participation....**

- Our Year 9 students in the **regional Debating Final** – this Wednesday 21 August at 6pm – coached by teacher Kirrily Scarff who does the most amazing job.

Keep watching our street sign and website for updates on all that our students pursue in our school and how they fare. My sincere thanks to all teachers – so very many – who give up the time away from their own families to coach, mentor and train our students.

4. **Families** – you have been amazing in enrolling to our communication functionality **QParents** – such quality endorsement from every parent who has joined – real benefit in the 'one stop shop' method where you find absolutely everything about your child – report cards, assessment planners, fee accounts, attendance record and the list goes on. If you have not yet joined and would like some help, just phone our office 4636 7500 – our staff are very keen to assist you.

5. **NAPLAN Online for the first time for our Year 7 and 9 students 2020** – we are preparing ourselves well and truly out from the event in May 2020. All schools are required to participate in a School Readiness Test [SRT] – ours will take place with our current Year 7 and our Year 8 students [Year 9 in 2020 and will be undertaking the NAPLAN Online assessment] in week 10 of this Term which will be after their Term subject assessments are finished. The SRT is a simple way of letting students see what a question looks like on screen and how it is set up, no student name is attached and so no result is offered – it is very much a familiarisation process and in doing so, the intent is to allay any concern of our students. Our relevant staff are in training as well as they learn how to conduct the test in the online space.

6. **The handover of our new 6.4 million dollar building the Caldwell Performing Arts Centre** – 7 August saw founding Performing Arts teachers at Centenary Heights State High School, Peter and Sandy Caldwell come in to tour the building and be acknowledged by our staff. For 25 years Peter and Sandy grew all of the Performing Arts options

at our school and forever embedded the stamp of high quality on whatever was happening in this area. Former students Erin Mallet and Chrissie Lodder spoke at the gathering on 7 August – Erin and Chrissie are exemplary teachers at CHSHS now – and their verbal tribute to the Caldwells said it all – two people dedicated to the service of students and families and who have influenced so many young minds over time. So fitting that the building is named after them. Staff have moved in and students begin their classes in there this week. I acknowledge Hutchinson's Builders who had the project and yet again, were simply outstanding in terms of their interaction with our school staff and the service and quality of their work is second to none. I also acknowledge our Head of Facilities in the Darling Downs South West region Dave Jago. Dave makes it all happen so seamlessly. Our staff member and Project Coordinator Sandy Hearnden once again provided the leadership and attention to detail that is a mark of her work always. Sandy has now overseen approximately 20 million dollars' worth of improvements at CHSHS.

7. **Student Leader nominations and process to elect our 2020 leaders** – last week and this week we are in the throes of listening to the speeches of nominees as delivered, on average, to two year levels so nearly 600 strong audience. Our student audience is wonderful, so well aware that public speaking is not easy. Our nominees have as always, been exceptional – so well prepared and attired, so inspiring in their deliveries. This is a really special time of year.

8. **School Opinion Survey** – many thanks to those parents/carers who have completed the online survey which closes this Friday 23 August. This feedback is highly instructive always for me as we take our school forward.

YEAR 10 CAREER DAYS

The Year 10 cohort is a new generation of Australian Tertiary Assessment Rank (ATAR) and for all 282 of us, exploring this pathway has been innovative, challenging and exciting. The Career Education Program focuses on the best suited pathway for the future for all Year 10 students. During term 2, the students have gained information on career profiling, writing a resume and cover letter and attended a simulated interview with members of the public at our schools Annual Year 10 Mock Interviews.

We also had 110 students who attended the TAFE Open Day. The Year 10 cohort, is the largest group of students we have had attend the TAFE Open Day. This experience was a great opportunity for our students to visit the campus and its facilities, meet staff and current students and ask important questions about courses, TAFE at Schools program and student life.

We also had 108 students attend USQ Careers Day. This day offered the students an invaluable experience and an insight into what USQ has to offer. The day presented tailored-made sessions to suit the areas of interest for the students. Each student received a gift pack with a careers guide and subject selection guide for prerequisites for university in years 11 and 12 and information about the USQ Head Start Program.

MATHEMATICS Update

There has been a lot happening in Mathematics at Centenary Heights SHS so far in 2019:

Curriculum:

- The introduction of the New Senior Curriculum for all Year 11 students, with the introduction of new subjects Essential Maths (was Pre-Vocational Maths), General Maths (was Maths A), Maths Methods (was Maths B), and Specialist Maths (was Maths C). These subjects so far have proven slightly more demanding than what were the previous Senior subjects. However, the majority of students have chosen well at their Senior Education & Training (SET) Planning meetings last year, with only minimal changes of subject in Maths so far in 2019. Work is ongoing in developing the supporting resources in these subjects so our students are best prepared to meet the learning and assessment requirements moving forward to Year 12 in 2020.
- The Yumi-Deadly Maths Program is continuing, with the completion of training of key teachers in 2019, and then the mentoring of further teaching staff to happen 2019/2021 to spread the knowledge of the program's principles of practical hands-on activities to improve learning outcomes for students. The focus of this program is in the early years of high school, Years 7 to 10, but we have also seen the benefits spill into senior subjects. This teacher PD program has already seen the embedding of many activities within our Junior School Maths programs, with both students and teachers reporting the benefits to our Aboriginal and Torres-Strait Islander students and to our entire student body.
- Mathspace has continued to be trialled across all Junior classes, providing a valuable on-line resource where teachers can easily see and check for student learning and understanding. For students, it provides support when they are learning how to tackle particular types of mathematical questions, in particular when

attempting to complete homework tasks, where they can, at the click of a button, access hints when they get stuck, or even watch a video demonstrating how to do the particular type of question. This gives students control of their learning and the ability to review concepts they may not have fully understood in class. In 2020, the Mathspace E-book will become our main student textbook for Year 7 to 10, ensuring students have easy access to their learning in maths through their BYOD laptops.

Extra-curricula Activities:

- 9 students from Years 9 and 10 completed the USQ Maths Enrichment program in Semester 1, enjoying a series of interesting and challenging learning experiences in Mathematics that relates to but goes beyond what is learnt in the school curriculum.
- Teams from Year 7 to 12 competed in the Maths Team Challenge again this year. Centenary Heights SHS had one of its most successful years, with our Year 10 team winning the Intermediate division, the Year 11 and 12 teams finishing a close second and third respectively in the Senior division. The Year 7 team also finished a very creditable 4th in the Junior division competing against year 8 and other Year 7 teams from other local schools.
- The Year 7/8 QAMT Maths Quiz has begun with amazing results for CHSHS: in our first round our teams came 1st, 2nd and 6th, so all three teams now go through to the Regional Final.
- Five Year 10/11/12 girls attended a Careers in Maths Symposium at QUT in Brisbane with the girls coming away with some valuable ideas of just where a focus on their love of Mathematics can take them.

A reminder that if students wish to trial for a Central Zone, TSSS or Darling Downs team, they are required to listen to student notices, collect a nomination package from F Block noticeboard or download a copy from the school website in the sport section. Students are required to also meet the following criteria to participate in a school team:

- Full commitment to classroom learning and assessment schedule
- School fee payments up to date
- Behaviour level on Gold or Green
- If students have assessment on any extra curricular sport day, the assessment takes priority
- To participate in school teams, students are required to turn up to meetings and trials and be prepared to attend all required training sessions leading up to competitions.
